The Kunsthaus Graz exhibition *what will be* explores traces of the future that can be found in the here and now. From our current position, distant and not so distant developments are made tangible, holding the prospect of shaping society in a multidimensional way. Instead of one single grand design for the future, we find a plurality of futures. The exhibition at the Kunsthaus looks at various areas of society and seeks to identify pioneering scenarios that open up perspectives for political, economic, ecological, social and cultural action in the near or distant future.

Themes

The exhibition investigates urgent issues around the climate crisis, digitalisation and the distribution of resources and space, gender equality and digital ethics. Cross-disciplinary projects examine new ideas for care, the responsible use of soil and energy, building with renewable raw materials such as wood or mycelium, sustainable packaging, ecological management and sustainable mobility. The focus is also on inter-school education, learning with VR, co-determination, participation, protest and – last but not least – the transformational role of art and culture in shaping a discursive society. Key aspects are the approaches of complete cycles and systemic networking, which shape both the recycled and recyclable design and the concept of this collectively researched and assembled exhibition.

The exhibition

The exhibition combines local initiatives, academic research and artistic works. It unfolds across all levels of the Kunsthaus, from the foyer to the exhibition spaces to the Needle, spilling out over the forecourt and onto the Internet. *what will be* makes use of existing networks and builds new ones. Ecological, economic, social and cultural issues are tackled from a range of perspectives in an interdisciplinary and diverse way, while remarkable projects and developments from different areas of society are brought together and presented to a broad public.

In this way the exhibition opens up to the public a multi-dimensional network examining the exchanges between present, the past and the future; between research, mediation and artistic visions; between reality and imagination, and between possibilities and realities.

Activities

A wide range of activities will accompany the exhibition. Six theme-specific nights on digitalisation, (un)learning, resources, transformation, activisms and collaboration, workshops, lectures, discussions, film evenings, city walks and excursions with various cooperation partners, podcasts, devised in close cooperation with the art education section and in part between institutions with the Folklife Museum and the History Museum, presenting a diversity of voices that recognises and reflects the diversity of the audience.
